## **Holiday Safety Tips**

Be sure your holidays are happy and safe by:

- Keeping your fresh tree well-watered
- Using only UL approved lights and not overloading circuits
- Turning off all lights & electrical decorations before bedtime
- Limiting the use of extension cords
- Not using candles as decorations
- Disposing of fireplace ashes outside, away from the home, and in a metal container
- Never leaving candles burning when you are not in the room
- Keeping candles away from combustible materials and in a glass or ceramic container

If you do need assistance from the Fire and Rescue Department you can help by making sure your address is clearly visible from the street. When there is snow on the ground clear the snow from around the fire hydrants near your home.

# Did You Know? Leaves Don't Belong in the Sewer

It was recently brought to the attention of Civic Association Board, that a person hired in the community to do yard work was blowing leaves into the storm drain. The county suggested we reach out to the community and educate everyone on what the county rules are regarding leaf disposal. Not too many folks are aware that the Storm water Management Ordinance Chapter 124 prohibits leaves to be blown into streams or storm drains. Excessive amount of leaves can clog storm drains, interfere with aquatic life that live in the streams, and add too much organic matter to the streams. Here is the ordinance:

Section 124-9-3. - Illicit Discharges to the Storm Sewer System and State Waters.

A. It shall be unlawful for any Person to discharge or deposit, or to cause **or allow to be discharged or deposited any wastes, trash, leaves, grass clippings,** soil, oil, petroleum products, noxious or flammable substances, or any matter causing or adding pollution in any state waters of this County or on any property in this County in any manner so as to allow any such substance to be washed into state waters by storm or flood water. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the discharge or deposit of waste in state waters when such discharging has been approved by a state agency.

B. It shall be unlawful for any Person to discharge or deposit, or to cause or allow to be discharged or deposited in the County MS4, any wastes, trash, leaves, grass clippings, oil, petroleum products, noxious or flammable substances, or any matter causing or adding pollution; provided however, that leaves may be piled at curbs during such seasons and in such areas as may now or in the future be furnished mechanical leaf collection service. It is the intent of this provision to prohibit the entry into the County MS4 of any substance, whether solid or liquid, other than naturally occurring surface or subsurface waters.

C. It shall be unlawful to connect any plumbing fixtures, drains, appurtenances, or appliances that discharge any substance other than storm water into the County MS4. (08-14-124.)

## A New Addition to Country Club View—"Little Free Library"

Thanks to the efforts of **Nate and Leigh Bergman**, Country Club View now has its very own "Little Free Library". For those of you who have never heard of this a "Little Free Library" is a "take a book, return a book" free book exchange. In its most basic form, it's a wooden box of books where anyone may pick up a book or two, or bring a book to share.

Little Free Library book exchanges have a unique, personal touch and there is an understanding that real people are sharing their favorite books with their community. These aren't just any old books; this is a carefully curated collection. The Library itself is a piece of neighborhood art that acts like a mini-town square.

Anyone may contribute or take books. The more the merrier! If you take a book (or two) from our Library, you do not need to return that exact book. However, in order to keep the Little Library full of good choices for the whole neighborhood, the next time you swing by the Library bring a few books to share. ### Beware . . . University Mall Towing Policy . . . Beware






