Since we have a few new families in the neighborhood, I would like to share a couple of the highlights of warmer weather for me. First are Fairfax County farmers markets! There are 11 farmer's markets currently listed on the county website at <a href="http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/parks/wp-farm-mkt.htm">http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/parks/wp-farm-mkt.htm</a>. They run from Wednesday through Sunday at varying times of the day to accommodate most any schedule. All items sold are grown within 125 miles of Fairfax County. The beautiful array of brightly colored fresh fruits and vegetables is visually tantalizing and smells wonderful during strawberry and blueberry season.

Another summertime favorite is the huge selection of free summer concerts. The closest venue to CCV is Braddock Nights on Fridays at 7:30 p.m. at Royal Lake. If one is willing to travel a little further, there are many other choices - and on varying nights as well. These events are all child and dog friendly. While you may not be under any legal obligation to get a neighbor's approval for changes on private property, it is always nice to maintain the good will of one's neighbors and speaking with them prior to making improvements will go a long way toward that. It is much easier to work out differences in the planning stages than when a contractor arrives with supplies! Since we in CCV are a civic association, our only requirements are that your improvements meet county code.

### Neighborhood Watch Needs You!

The Neighborhood Watch needs individuals/ couples who are willing to patrol the neighborhood for **two hours three times a year**. We know everyone has commitments but we are asking you to find six hours a year to help keep your community safe. We especially need watch standers who can go out during the day. The program also needs people who can call watch standers the week before they are scheduled to remind them of the watch. If you have a cell phone you can be a watch stander. Training is provided.

If you are unable to participate as an active watch stander remember everyone in the community is still part of the watch. Be alert as you go about your daily business, know your neighbors, make notes of suspicious activity or vehicles and call the police if you feel there is something wrong.

The watch serves an important role in the community. Statistics show that neighborhoods with an active watch have a lower crime rate. The watch serves as the eyes and ears of the police and your CCVCA board. It is also an opportunity to get out in the community and meet your neighbors and see what is happening in CCV.

Earlier this month several CCV residents had packages delivered by the USPS, FEDEX, and UPS stolen. If you are expecting valuable packages you can request signature required delivery. I know this is inconvenient but it will ensure your package is safe. If you have a neighbor who is home during the day, have them be on the lookout for the delivery and hold it for you.

As a reminder, don't leave valuables in your vehicle and lock the doors when you leave it on the street.

IT'S GAME TIME...

THE WORLD POLICE& FIRE GAMES COME TO FAIRFAX COUNTY! Stephen Belisle, CCVCA First Vice President

The 2015 World Police and Fire Games kick off around our Country Club View community on June 26, with an opening ceremony at RFK Stadium, and end on July 5, with a closing ceremony at Wolf Trap National Park. This is one of the largest, multi-sport, multi-venue events in the world, drawing more than 12,000 athletes from police, fire, and other public safety agencies, who represent about 70 countries and will compete in 1,600 medal events across 61 sports in other words, this is a massive 10-day event happening around us. All of the sports events are open to the public and free to watch, although a few events require a complimentary ticket due to venue capacity. For some events, you would not need to travel far: George Mason is hosting baseball, basketball, bodybuilding, boxing, martial arts, orienteering, swimming, tennis, track & field, volleyball, and wrestling; and Robinson also is hosting tennis. This is a great opportunity for everyone, particularly kids, to see Olympic-like sports competition right in our backyard (for free), and to honor and celebrate our community heroes.


