


Clear the Way for Your Neighbors!

It's great to see so many of our neighbors out in the community: Moms, dads, grandparents, kids, and even dogs traversing the sidewalk with strollers, bikes, skateboards, and wagons! Without a doubt being outside in the neighborhood has become much more popular in recent months. There's also been plenty of rain this spring and summer, so the foliage is more abundant than ever. Have you noticed that there are lots of bushes and limbs obstructing the sidewalks? Please take a look at the sidewalks around your property and trim back some of the foliage to allow passersby easy traveling.

Also, check that your house number is clearly visible. Foliage can obstruct mailbox numbers and house numbers. This is especially important when painted curb house numbers are no longer visible. Easily seen house numbers are vital to mail deliverers and the fire department.

Your Voice and Vote from Local to State

There are two kinds of people we residents elect to represent our legislative voice: the community volunteer and the certified official. Both have responsibilities to their constituents and to the rules that they work under, from our local community by-laws up to our state and national constitutions. Note that we also elect non-legislative county officials such as the Sherriff, Commonwealth Attorney, and Soil and Water Director.

There are about 2,052 named communities in Fairfax County and every one of their residents can express an opinion, issue, or gripe to these volunteers and officials. (They also always warmly appreciate a friendly "Hello!" at the grocery store or at an office.) So who are these people in our elected "Chain of Command"?

Many people represent your voice as a resident of Country Club View in Fairfax County, Virginia. Let's start with the local elected community volunteers, and note that it is through these volunteer organizations that our elected officials receive the weighty collective voice of their constituents. Here is the list:

- **Country Club View Civic Association** This is our strong and active community and is the grassroots of the saying "All politics is local". The CCVCA President is Amye Rheault at ccvca@countryclubview.org, and its website is http://countryclubview.org/.
- **Braddock District Council of Citizens Associations** This is our Magisterial District community representation, along with many of our neighboring communities. The Chairman is George Becerra at Chair@bdcfx.org, and its web site is http://www.bdcfx.org.
- Fairfax County Federation of Citizens Associations The Federation represents both district councils of community associations and individual communities across Fairfax County, including HOA, civic, citizen, condominium, coop, residential, and apartment associations. The President is Bill Barfield (hey, that's me!) at FedPres2020@fairfaxfederation.org, and its web site is http://www.fairfaxfederation.org.

And now, the certified elected legislative officials: **Fairfax County** is divided into 9 Magisterial Districts, each with about 129,000 residents and each managed by an elected Supervisor. These nine and one at-large as Chairman are the governing body of Fairfax County, called the Board of Supervisors:

- Braddock District Our District Supervisor is James Walkinshaw at (703) 425-9300 and braddock@fairfaxcounty.gov.
- Fairfax County The Chairman of the Board of Supervisors is Jeff McKay at (703) 324-2321 and chairman@fairfaxcounty.gov.

The **Commonwealth of Virginia** has a bicameral legislature called the General Assembly with two Houses, the House of Delegates and the Senate. CCV has a representative in both Houses:

- State Delegate CCV is in the 37th House District with David Bulova our Delegate at (703) 310-6752 and DelDBulova@house.virginia.gov.
- State Senator CCV is in the 34th Senate District with Chap Petersen our Senator at (703) 349-3361 and district34@senate.virginia.gov.
- Governor Ralph Northam is at (804) 786-2211 and http://www.governor.virginia.gov/.

The **U.S. Congress** provides CCV with the biggest bang for our voice buck, potentially affecting national opinions and events. It, too, has two legislative houses:

- **House of Representatives** CCV is in the 11th Virginia Congressional District with Gerry Connolly our Congressman, reached at (202) 225-1492, email http://connolly.house.gov/.
- United States Senate CCV, like all Virginians, is represented by two U.S. Senators:

Fall Fire Safety Tips

Fall is just around the corner. Early fall is the time to take care of a few things that will help to make your home safer. Most importantly, check your winter heating system. Whether you have a gas or oil furnaces or you use a wood burning system, it is important to have them checked by a reputable maintenance company to ensure they are clean and functioning efficiently.

If you burn wood, have your chimney and flu cleaned and inspected. Wood byproducts can over time coat the chimney liner and lead to a roaring fire several feet above your fireplace. You can tell if you a have a problem if the chimney is drawing in more air than normal and you hear a roaring sound. This is a chimney on fire. If this happens, call 911 immediately and if you can, close the fireplace glass front if you have one to reduce the amount of fresh air being drawn up to the fire and evacuate your residence.

Also, be sure to place all ashes from wood fires in a metal container and store outside away from your home. Ashes are deceiving and stay hot for a significant length of time. DO NOT store the container on your deck. That is the cause of most of fall/winter house fires in the county.

Fertilize for Fall

Did you know that fall is the best time to fertilize your lawn? Get your lawn ready now to look great next spring, and you'll have more time when the weather warms up to enjoy yourself!

- Leave grass clippings on the lawn after mowing. Nitrogen from the clippings will nourish the soil which means you'll need less fertilizer.
- Wait until fall to fertilize to avoid creating weak roots. Excessive fertilizer won't help your lawn; it will weaken it and send runoff into the Chesapeake Bay where crabs and oysters are already at risk of harm from fertilizer run-off.
- Get a soil test to find out the best type and amount of fertilizer for your yard.
- Apply it right. Use only the amount of fertilizer you really need. Too much fertilizer will actually weaken your lawn. Keep fertilizer off paved surfaces and don't apply it before it rains. Otherwise, you'll just be sending the fertilizer—and your money—down the drain.
- Use compost instead. Compost is not only a good alternative to fertilizer; it's also an excellent soil conditioner. Yards that use compost need less water and fertilizer, so you save money. Plus, you can get one of those cool compost bins.
