#### **September Membership Meeting Recap**

On Thursday, Sept 29th CCVCA Board and Members gathered during the annual Fall Membership Meeting, held at St. Mary's Farrell Hall. Those in attendance heard from our guest speakers; voted on our 2023 Budget Proposal (shared with the September News Bulletin to all members); and discussed the Ice Cream Social, Scholarship Raffle, and then-upcoming Halloween event.

Virginia Delegate David Bulova shared 2022 Session Highlights and his leadership on issues related to environment, education, and loud vehicle concerns. Delegate Bulova discussed the redistricting that will go into effect in 2024 which does impact our immediate area.

Braddock Supervisor James Walkinshaw is also working to address the loud vehicle concerns. Another current action item for the Supervisor's Office is the trash pickup problems that many have been facing. Additionally, Supervisor Walkinshaw reminded us that October is Suicide Prevention Month and planned to participate in the suicide prevention walk himself.

Our agenda also included the new Fairfax County Public Schools Superintendent Dr. Michelle Reid who held a Town Hall at Robinson the same evening as our meeting. CCVCA's Robinson Liaison, Erin Dyal, attended both meetings and continues to keep us informed of FCPS developments primarily via the Country Club View Residents Facebook Group.

#### **Winter Safety Tips**

#### **Heating Safety**

- The number one safety tip revolves around your winter heating system. Whether you have gas or oil furnaces or have a wood burning system, it is important to have it checked by a reputable maintenance company to ensure they are clean and functioning efficiently.
- ✓ It is especially important to have your chimney and flu cleaned and inspected if you burn wood. Wood byproducts over time can coat the chimney liner and lead to a roaring fire several feet above your fireplace.
  - You can tell if you a have a problem if the chimney is drawing in more air than normal, and you hear a roaring sound. This is a chimney on fire. If this happens, call 911 immediately, and if you can, close the fireplace glass front if you have one to reduce the amount of fresh air being drawn up to the fire. Then evacuate your residence.
  - Also be sure to place all ashes in a metal container and store outside away from your home. Ashes are deceiving and stay hot for a significant length of time. DON'T store the container on your deck. That is the cause of the majority of winter house fires in the county.

#### **Holiday Safety**

- Keep your fresh tree well watered.
- Use only UL approved lights and do not overload circuits.
- Turn off all lights and electrical decorations before bedtime.
- Limit the use of extension cords.
- Do NOT use candles as decorations.
- Dispose of fireplace ashes outside, away from the home, and in a metal container.
- Never leave candles burning when you are not in the room.
- Keep candles away from combustible materials and in a glass or ceramic container.

If you do need assistance from the Fire and Rescue Department for any reason you can help by making sure your address is clearly visible from the street. When there is snow on the ground you can also clear the snow from around the fire hydrants near your home.

#### Winter Driving Safety

Winter driving is different and requires different skills and a greater level of preparedness. Remember that many residents are new to the area and many have never driven in winter conditions, so drive defensively, stay alert, and put down the mobile phone.

- Be sure your tires, battery, and windshield wipers are in good condition.
- Check your anti-freeze level and test its effectiveness. You can buy an inexpensive tester at any auto parts store
  or have it checked by your favorite mechanic.
- Visibility can be severely compromised by snow, so be sure you clear ALL your windows of snow and ice before
  heading out on the road. Also, remove snow and ice from the top of your vehicle so it doesn't blow off onto
  other vehicles and cause an accident. It's the law. Also, keep your headlights on while driving.
- Keep your windshield washer fluid topped off. Put a can of deicer spray in your vehicle.
- Maintain a safe distance and speed. Avoid sharp turns or quick lane changes on snow or ice. Be alert for black ice conditions.
- Keep an emergency kit in your vehicle (blankets, food and water, small shovel, flares, extra gloves, and boots)
   for use in the event you are stranded.
- If you are home and snow is forecasted, remember it is your responsibility to clear your sidewalks as soon as possible. If possible, park your vehicle in your driveway or if you park on the street, park on the **odd** numbered side so that plows can clear a wider path on the roadway and make their job easier and faster.

#### **Eating Fresh and Local through the Seasons**

Did you know that there is a community-supported agriculture (CSA) drop-off site here in Country Club View? Are you interested in receiving weekly fresh produce in the spring, summer, and fall? If so, sign up to receive more information about the Potomac Vegetable Farms CSA program!

Community-supported agriculture (CSA) is a farming model that builds a mutually beneficial relationship between the farm and the customer: the consumer buys a share of the farm and in exchange receives a weekly supply of fresh produce. There are many benefits to eating locally grown produce, including preserving local farmland and green space, nourishing ourselves with seasonal, fresh (and better tasting!) foods, and supporting the local economy.

Potomac Vegetable Farms has been growing and selling local vegetables for over 50 years. The farms—located in Vienna and Purcellville—are woman-owned and operated and use ecoganic farming practices. They offer a wide selection, customizable for your needs and preferences: specifically, you can elect to receive a mini, regular, or robust share on a weekly or biweekly basis, and you always have the option of swapping items or rescheduling your share if you are out of town.



Sign-up for the 2023 CSA will occur on February 1 with weekly deliveries from June through November. 

#### **Redistricting: Who Is My Elected Official?**

Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution mandates that a U.S. census take place every 10 years. The number of people across the U.S. determines the number of seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives. The census also determines how hundreds of billions of dollars in federal funds are distributed to local communities. It therefore requires accounting for the population changes by doing a re-balancing of the number of people in every voter district of each state and each county.

This "head count" balancing is called "redistricting" and is done by redrawing state and county district boundaries to make each kind of district have about the same number of people. In spite of the political and financial controversy, all states have accomplished this decennial Constitutional task.

In Virginia, the redistricting boundary changes put Country Club View into new State Senate and House voting districts. In accordance with The Code of Virginia Title § 24.2-311. (see <a href="https://law.lis.virginia.gov/vacode/title24.2/chapter3/section24.2-311/">https://law.lis.virginia.gov/vacode/title24.2/chapter3/section24.2-311/</a>), redistricting changes are effective after the next Senate and House elections in 2023.

In other words, in January, 2024, the redistricting boundary changes will move CCV into State Senate District 35 (currently Dick Saslaw, Democrat) and into State Delegate District 10 (currently Wendy Gooditis, Democrat). Note that these officials may change after the 2023 elections.

Currently, in 2022 and 2023, our State and County elected representatives don't change: Congressman Gerry Connolly (D-11<sup>th</sup>), Senator Chap Petersen (D-34th), Delegate David Bulova (D-37<sup>th</sup>), and Supervisor (James Walkinshaw (D-Braddock). We remain in Fairfax County voter precinct 120 Sideburn.
